Ms. Irene tells us that the primary children have really been enjoying activities in practical life lately. These are hands on works that give children real life experience in tasks that they normally see adults performing. Maria Montessori taught us that developing children should have a chance to experience these activities using tools that are suited to their size, and that rather than "pretend" to sweep, rake, or scrub a table, they should actually do this meaningful work, and get the rewarding sense of accomplishment that comes with that. They also gain fine motor skills and coordination, and perhaps even the satisfaction of a job well done! Practical Life is a key component of a Montessori classroom, and this year, being outdoors offers lots of nice opportunities for the students to contribute to the care of their space.

The class will be having a book exchange before we disband for the winter break! Please have your child bring a book to give at the class party no later than Friday, December 18th. This book can be lightly used or purchased, spending no more than \$5. Families have the option of seeking out a fun
