The same holds true for carrying their backpack, hanging it up on their hook, changing their shoes... all can be performed solo by a child at this age. We don't look for perfection, but it is certainly an endearing moment when a child figures it out and takes pride in their effort!

Observations give you a glimpse into the daily proceedings in the classroom. Parent/teacher conferences will begin later in the month. Please plan to arrive in time to read our updated Guidelines for Observation before entering the class.

## Around the AP

Montessori Secondary programs, what we refer to as the Adolescent Program or AP, incorporates rigorous academic studies with purposeful work, and strives to prepare our youth to become contributing adult citizens who are self-confident and possess skills needed to thrive in society. The developmental stage of adolescence is quite unique. This is a period of tremendous physical and neurological growth for the child. They are experiencing heightened self-awareness and self-criticism, mercurial emotions, and egocentrism. This leads to an increased desire for autonomy and can also fuel peer pressure. But not to worry! Our program aims to guide our students through these sensitive social and cognitive periods by nurturing creativity and courage. Ms Joyce has years of experience teaching 7th through 12th grades and is specifically trained in the Montessori AP curriculum, one developed to safeguard the well-being of our youth while preparing them for adulthood. The Montessori education for these students focuses on helping them live full, vital lives.



The math and language lessons in this class can be daunting at first as the children leave behind the materials of the upper elementary and learn to explore numbers and themes in the abstract. It could be said, however, that the materials are still there, but they have changed... they have become the tools of woodworking, the compass in orienteering, the Friday lunch budget, the blocks in robotics, the science behind a pinhole camera, the chemistry of processing the film.

We are so proud of this program and we look forward to watching it grow, along with the children within!
