The elementary students have been working on family trees in conjunction with their studies in taxonomy. Montessori classrooms work hard to make connections between the work given throughout the year, and this is especially true with the Great Lessons. Learning about our place in the world and where we come from is an important process in realizing our vast potential. The children will begin this month constructing and presenting the classroom ofrenda. An ofrenda is a memorial displayed to honor lost loved ones and a tradition in the celebration of Día de los Muertos. Offerings and photos are placed upon the ofrenda to honor our lost loved ones and to help us remember and celebrate their lives. Ms. Elena taught the



students how to make traditional paper flowers to decorate the ofrenda and everyone in the classroom is invited to bring a photo or symbolic item representative of a lost love, be it a family member, friend, or cherished pet.
