

Montessori at home

While Montessori might sound like a lofty concept, it's actually all about cultivating the skills we humans need in our lives to thrive. In the school environment we endeavor to create a space with the right guidance and tools to accelerate learning opportunities, but the whole world is a child's oyster to find everything they need to keep growing! Ms. Evie jokingly describes parenting as "working yourself out of a job." But in truth, is that not the end goal? To release them into the world as prepared human beings? Here are a few ideas to give



your child the confidence and satisfaction that comes with a job well done! Toddlers love to help with folding laundry, and there is even an illustration of fractions involved in folding a washcloth first into halves, and then into quarters. Lower elementary children (who are quite opinionated as you no doubt have noticed) delight in being part of the decision-making process of planning meals, shopping for ingredients, and preparing food. It's a long process, and requires supervision, but involving your child in each step of this process (cleanup too!) teaches a myriad of essential lessons including personal responsibility, practical life skills, and even grace and courtesy. What better way to teach gratitude than experiencing firsthand the effort and planning that goes into these everyday acts of service we perform for our loved ones? Parenting books often urge parents to say less and let their children learn by doing. A tried and true Montessori adage "normalization through work" comes to mind! Upper elementary children most likely already have a fair amount of knowledge under their belts, but can still gain so much by doing. As personality clashes occur, which is a normal and

inevitable part of this stage of development, try giving your adolescent a job to complete as tempers cool, and time to reflect before returning to the discussion calmer. Parenting is the toughest and most important job of all! We literally shape the future of humankind as we guide our young towards taking ownership of their world. We think that's worth working for!
